



Why Lent?

Friends,

I can't believe it, but Ash Wednesday is just around the corner, arriving on February 14. Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, and—in the Church's calendar—Lent is tied to Easter; therefore, since Easter is almost as early as it can possibly be this year, Ash Wednesday is, too!

As I said, Lent is anchored to Easter weekend. As a season, Lent is forty days long and runs between Ash Wednesday and Good Friday...but, if you look at your phone calendar, you'll see that that's not actually forty days! It's forty-six! To square the math, you have to know that the Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Good Friday aren't considered a part of Lent. This is because Lent is a penitential season, and Sundays—as, themselves, tiny Easters—are always days of celebration. You never fast on a Sunday; you feast, because Christ is risen!


Historically, the Lenten season is rooted in the ancient Church's practice of performing baptisms primarily on Easter. Lent was the season of study, self-denial, and preparation before the initiate entered into the baptismal waters. Hence its color: purple. Purple has long been associated symbolically with penitence. Today, churches like ours don't follow this practice of baptizing only on Easter, but observing the season of Lent continues to be an important time of reassessment and renewal. To that end, I want to offer you the following passage, as a concise but solid understanding of how Lent might be understood by us today:

Briefly put, Lent is like an ellipse: It is a single entity with a double focus. The Forty Days are (1) a time for a probing consideration of our human condition, including sin and its deadly consequences for both individuals and society, and (2) a time for an equally intense consideration of the new possibilities offered to us in Jesus Christ....in a sense, our Lenten journey takes us through the ellipse lengthwise. At the start of Lent (whose tone is set by Ash Wednesday), we are more fully aware of disobedience as our focus. By the close of the Forty Days (whose tone is set by Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and the approach of Easter), we are more keenly attuned to the benefits of divine redemption. We begin by stressing penitence: an acknowledgement of our rebellion against God and our alienation from God's whole creation. We move on to the fruits of repentance: the amendment of life that results when we turn around and by God's grace head in a new direction.¹

As we begin this season together, as we—with Christ—turn our faces towards Jerusalem, let us keep in mind the sure and certain hope that we will celebrate on Easter Sunday...and let us reflect upon the reason(s) that that sure and certain hope needed to be accomplished on our behalf and offered to us out of love.

There are currently 16 families waiting hopefully for furniture, but Safe Havens has no more bedroom dressers or chests of drawers. If you or someone you know has a gently used dresser or chest (scratches are ok but drawers must be working), please consider donating it. Safe Havens will come pick up the furniture, but you must have someone there to help load it on the trailer. As an alternative, \$90 to Safe Havens would enable them to purchase a used dresser from a thrift store. 


NEEDED
