"All Things in Common" One-Year Update (Part One) By B.J. Hutto, Senior Pastor

Friends,

Right at a year ago now, HAB went through a weeks-long, deep dive into our church's finances. It was an opportunity for members of the Budget & Finance Committee to spend time with congregants in their Sunday Bible Study classes and learn about the historical arc of HAB's budget, its recent history, and its (then-)current situation. As the B&F Committee—ably led by Jack Mitchell—put this curriculum together, there was concern that it would fail, that people wouldn't be interested in having these conversations. In fact, the opposite happened. In most classes, discussion was so robust and healthy that they barely had time to get through the material. At the end of the study, we came together in the fellowship hall and discussed how we should move

forward. Again, the discussion was robust. And after it was all said and done, five items were elevated as priorities by the congregation. Thus, now that a year has gone by, I'll be using my *Herald* articles this month and next in order to let you all know how those areas are faring.

1st - "We need to educate our congregants regarding the meaning of stewardship, since many of our people come from traditions that did not discuss this." Hopefully, this is an area where progress is apparent. Alongside the "All Things in Common" conversation itself, HAB now has a Stewardship Team that is actively working to increase congregants' thoughtfulness about generosity and their understanding of the church's financial needs. We have a continually-updated bar chart on the back of our orders of worship each Sunday. In the 11:00 worship service we have changed the offertory time from a prayer to a litany, hoping that the participatory nature of the call and response will help people better understand their giving to HAB, and we have instituted a pledge campaign simply as a spiritual discipline for congregants, giving church members the opportunity to prayerfully set goals for themselves throughout the year and be honest about what those goals are. Each of these initiatives is a chance for all of us to be better informed about our church's life and needs and to be better equipped to respond to that life gratefully and generously—and as the Stewardship Team continues to work together (our next meeting is in two weeks), more opportunities will be forthcoming.

2nd - "We must provide quality children's programming, which will require some investment, including the employment of a children's minister." This is another area where I can report good progress. Last summer, Chelsea Weise stepped in as HAB's Director of Children and Community Life, and—while she continues her work as principal of Little Friends Preschool—she is ably and lovingly caring for HAB's children. I have seen her work both as a colleague and as a parent (our son, Elijah, is in her program), and I know the quality of the lessons she is teaching the kids on Wednesday nights and, perhaps more importantly, that her lessons are sticking with them when they go home. And I know this because, even days later, Elijah can tell me what their lesson was about. Chelsea relates well to both kids and parents. She's weaving storytelling, activities, crafts, and prayer together to not just teach their minds, but to genuinely form their young hearts. Truly, if you know of a preschool or elementary-aged child, then you should make sure that they're under Chelsea's care!

That's it for this month (Laraine says I'm out of space!), so keep an eye out, next month, for updates on the final three priorities that y'all highlighted in our conversations last spring. Personally, I'm grateful for the congregation's energy around our "All Things in Common" series, and I'm also grateful for the energy and interest that y'all continue to have, not just around these issues but, more importantly, around the life, witness, and wellbeing of our church!

Helping her community and being of service is at Anna Valent's core. She knew from a young age that being involved in something bigger than herself was what she was meant to do - and she does just that. Not only professionally as the incoming executive director of Dreams Come True, but through her volunteer work as well.

"I always knew I wanted to be in a service role," Valent said. "At the end of the day, what drives me is knowing that what I'm doing is impacting something else."

Valent grew up in Georgia, most recently in St. Simon's Island. She left after graduating high school to attend the University of Florida (UF) and swim at the collegiate level; she was a worldranked distance freestyle swimmer and the 2002-2003 cocaptain of the swim team.

After graduating from UF with a degree in psychology and public relations, she was offered a position at the Make a Wish Foundation in Jacksonville.

"They wouldn't let me back in Georgia," Valent joked.

She didn't know anyone when she first moved to Jacksonville,

so she found a place downtown at 11 East Forsyth. She was one of the first residents, which consisted mostly of young people and recent graduates.

"I felt like that would be a good way to meet people," Valent said. She ended up not only making friends, but also meeting her future husband, Kevin, who had been in Jacksonville since age 12. "I always thought I would go back to Georgia and
