Friends,

From time to time, the modern world can make the Church seem superfluous. Who needs sanctuary choirs in the age of Spotify? Why bother with preachers when there are a-thousand-and-one podcasts? Why come to church to touch base with folks when you can keep track of their lives through Facebook and Instagram? The reality is that, in a digital age, churches can feel awfully analog....

But then, a few weeks ago, I had a conversation with someone here at HAB who was wrestling with questions that Google simply couldn't answer: Why am I here, and what is my purpose? How can God forgive me when I keep doing the same things over and over again, even after I

know they're wrong and harmful, and I've asked for forgiveness, but I keep doing them anyway? Can I actually *be* forgiven for what I've done? What if I can't forgive myself?

All of y'all know this person. She's sitting in the pews every week right next to you, or right behind you. *Heck, she might even be you*. But the point is, even if this wasn't you this time, we all eventually find ourselves wrestling with these same kinds of questions. In fact, it's almost a guaranteed lock that each and every person reading this article has gone around and around with these questions at least once in life.

And that's because these kinds of struggles are universal. It's Martin Luther, reflecting back on his youth, admitting that he didn't love God as a young priest. In fact, he hated God, he says, because he kept trying and failing to be a perfect Christian, and he hated the guilt he felt. It's St. Augustine confessing that every time he would pray out loud, "Lord, make me chaste," something in him would quietly add, "but please don't do it quite yet!" It's each of us, struggling to live within a world that is beautiful but broken and recognizing that same brokenness in ourselves and our loved ones, too. And it doesn't matter how modern our world might be; these ancient questions aren't going anywhere anytime soon.

My friends, summertime is officially upon us. And as summer moves along, our social media feeds and our conversations with friends and neighbors will be filled with wonderful stories and beautiful images. Vacations to faraway places. Photos of happy, smiling families. And I'm not going to say that those stories and those photos aren't true, but I will say that they're at least incomplete. They don't tell the whole story, because the whole story isn't so simple, and it is rarely so beautiful. Life is messy and hard; you all know this. But what can be so easy to miss these days is that life is messy and hard for everyone, not just for you, and behind the smiling faces—and beyond the beautiful vacation spots—of your neighbors, there are real struggles. Everyone is fighting some great battle in life.

So: *Take heart!* Know that, whatever great battle you're fighting, you are neither the first one to fight it nor the only one in your community currently doing so. Know that, whatever it is, it is not bigger than God's love, and know that if you ever need reminding of that fact—*literally, the greatest, truest fact in the history of the world*—your family here at HAB is ready to be there for you. Because, as it turns out, that's what we're doing here: We're telling you that God loves you. We're telling you that God loves your neighbors. We're telling you the truth, and the truth these days—the actual, unvarnished truth—can be a rare commodity.



He is married to the dynamic and successful businesswoman, Wallette Williams-Gundy, and they have a son named Andrew and two grandchildren.

Ms. Wallette Denise Williams-Gundy, wife of Dr. Gundy, is the First Lady of the Mount Sinai Missionary Baptist Church. Dr. Gundy says she is very astute, wise, intelligent, and clever. Wallette, working alongside Dr. Gundy as reader, editor, and advisor, has earned every degree he has. She graduated from Stanton High School in 1972 and attended Troy State University.

Wallette was the first American of African descent to model at the old May Cohens department store. She served as a retail manager and business owner of a hair salon until she retired. She is an advocate of peace and love for elders, children, and the world. She believes that women should have a voice in their lives and women must demand respect from others. For 20 years, she has served as the chairperson for the Sinai Sisters in Christ of Mount Sinai, which conducts retreats and women's conferences.

HAB Next Steps Ministry—\$500


Jacksonville Campus Ministry—\$500 (which will sponsor two meals)

Thank you again to all who supported the "Spread the Light" banquet and associated activities to raise a little over \$22,000.


More exciting mission news...

Also in April, we welcomed providers from the Social Services Outreach Mobile Unit of the **Urban Rest Stop** to the HAB campus. The Urban Rest Stop is a mobile service of the Sulzbacher Center and offers housing assessments, social security and disability benefit assistance, state ID vouchers, food stamps, and resources for other types of assistance needed. While a family emergency among the unit staff made the mobile unit itself unavailable on the planned day, two service providers were able to come to the church office and meet with neighbors in need from there. In three hours, the two providers met with and helped eight different individuals. Both providers left noting that they had "no idea that there was a need for *this* kind of help in our area." We plan to continue this partnership in the future!
