


Medical Debt Update



The HAB campus was a busy place on Valentine's Day! Our mission partner, United Community Outreach Ministry (UCOM), celebrated the volunteers of UCOM with a brunch in our fellowship hall. Approximately 130 people were in attendance, including our own Dr. B.J. Hutto and several church members who volunteer with UCOM answering phones, packaging food for the food pantry, and delivering

meals on wheels.









Mission Update: Safe Havens Ministry by Debbie Crumb, Mission Team Leader

Do you ever ask yourself how your donation to our mission partners is really being used? Well, Safe Havens Ministry used part of the money donated from the 2023 banquet to purchase items for two Karen refugee families from Myanmar. The majority of Karen are Christian, and many have fled Myanmar due to religious and



ethnic persecution by the Myanmar government (majority Buddhist). Safe Havens partners with the Southside Karen Baptist Church in Arlington to assist refugees with furniture and furnishings.



One of the families served is a family of four, and the other is a family of seven living in a two-bedroom house. They have lived in the house for approximately three years with no furniture except for beds. The money provided by HAB was used to rent a U-Haul truck to haul donated furniture for both households and was used to purchase items that were specific to the households, including curtain rods, plastic table cloth cover for a play table, a girls' twin bed (head and foot board, rails, and board slats), and a king metal bed frame. These donations made it possible for these families to have curtains in the window, a play table protected with a plastic cover, and a bed frame for beds so that they


did not have to sleep on a mattress on the floor. There are four or five core families living close to each other for support, and the play room that Safe Havens furnished will be used for all the group's children to gather together.

Mission Service Opportunity

On **Saturday, March 8**, we have an opportunity to partner with Safe Havens Ministry to paint a house for a family in need. The family are refugees from Myanmar and have purchased a home not far from our church. It's a small one-story house that we will have pressure washed in advance. All youth, parents, siblings, and friends are welcome to join us. If you're able to participate, please RSVP by scanning the QR code so that we know how many people to expect. Donations are welcome. Please bring work gloves, old paintbrushes, tarps, tape, ladders, trash bags, yard tools, etc.





Jim Smith Honored with a Retrospective at UNF Gallery of Art

HAB's own Jim Smith was honored with an opening reception on January 30 at the UNF Gallery of Art to kick off a month-long retrospective. The gallery is highlighting Smith's long career, showcasing major themes and artistic approaches using assemblage, photography, and metal sculpture. This exhibit focuses on the last 20 years of his production, a period that has left a profound impact on the local Jacksonville art community. The exhibit continues through March 5, so consider taking a look!

Jim is a long-time member of the HAB family, serving on our Art Ministry Team since its inception in 2010. Jim's enduring contribution to his church is the permanent sculpture and water feature entitled *The Rising*, which he designed and which was constructed from a twisted steel beam salvaged from the ruins of our sanctuary destroyed in the 2007 fire. The sculpture is installed at the entrance of our church office building.

American Red Cross Disaster Spiritual Care by Mary Nell McCoy

I was asked to share about my service with the American Red Cross (ARC) in Disaster Spiritual Care (similar to chaplaincy work). I became interested in chaplaincy work as I was nearing retirement from my teaching position in California. I took classes and was approved as a Disaster Relief Chaplain in 2012. I

deployed in-person with relief teams to fires, hurricanes, floods, and earthquakes throughout California, Colorado, the Philippines, and Nepal. I also began teaching chaplaincy courses, including a two-day training at the CBF (Cooperative Baptist Fellowship) Assembly in 2019.

In 2016 the American Red Cross opened up the area of Disaster Spiritual Care in California, and I took their training and was approved. When we moved to Florida in 2019, I was asked to be the Regional Lead for North Florida. Whenever there is a housefire across northern Florida, the occupants are asked if they would like Disaster Spiritual Care, and if so, I am given their information to contact them. As a Regional Lead, I oversee the vetting process for persons interested in becoming a part of our Disaster Spiritual Care team. Thankfully now, I have a team of volunteers that I can assign many of these client calls. I deployed in-person to Miami in 2021 when the building collapsed at Surfside and to the Tallahassee/Tampa area with the hurricanes that swept through that area.

During the pandemic, the ARC learned to serve clients better virtually. For three years I served on a virtual team set up to make calls to people who were sick with COVID or had family members that had passed away.

January 11-February 8, I was virtually deployed as part of the ARC National DSC (Disaster Spiritual Care) Call Center. There were 15 members of the team scattered across the United States. The first week we were given the names of over 2,200 people living in the fire zones to check on them to see if they were safe and if they had lost their homes. Taking 100 names at a time, we were able to contact all of them. Beginning January 27, the team was given the names of 625 clients requesting DSC services whose homes were damaged or completely destroyed. There have been over 12,000 homes destroyed in the fires, 29 people killed, and 31 people still missing. When talking with clients, we try to be supportive as they share their story and current situation. If they seem open to prayer, we provide prayer and encouragement. Clients are asked if they lost any religious/spiritual articles in the fire. If so, we are able to give them some money to replace these articles, though many are precious keepsakes that are irreplaceable.

During the week of February 10-14, four of us were asked to participate in a special assignment alongside four Disaster Mental Health workers to make follow-up calls to responders that had served in-person at the site of the aviation crash between a regional airline and a Black Hawk helicopter. This was a different type of deployment, offering support and a time for them to debrief.

Please be in prayer for all people experiencing major disasters in their lives and for the responders and volunteers serving to help meet these needs.
