Over the past several months, the Coordinating Council, staff, and a few members from other committees have met to study, discuss, and envision how we might faithfully respond to the shifting realities of culture, society, and church life. Through healthy conversation, seven new initiatives centered around community, children's ministry, and worship have emerged to guide us as a congregation. One of these initiatives is to refresh and reimagine our worship life at HAB, creating space for the many ways we express our faith and encounter God together.

As part of the worship initiative, we will be moving to one worship service permanently this fall—combining the best of both our 8:45 and 11:00 a.m. liturgies into a unified 11:00 a.m. service that provides a variety of musical, liturgical, and technological expressions that make up our church—and then some! This is a hopeful step forward, not a

farewell to the 8:45 a.m. service, which has been a meaningful part of HAB's heritage for decades. Instead, we are weaving together the traditions, gifts, and voices—what we like to think of as a mosaic of worship at HAB—for the 21st century. HAB worship will continue to feature thoughtful planning and beautiful expressions of our faith guided by Scripture. Creativity and vitality will be emphasized. Worshippers will still experience the beauty of the pipe organ, choir, and piano, while on some Sundays, we will be led by various ensembles, such as a band and even other musical expressions, such as jazz, bluegrass, and gospel, during special seasons.

There is already positive energy and excitement around the possibilities. This summer, I will work with a wonderful

team of people that includes Dawson McQuaig, Sissy McQuaig, P.J. Burkhalter, Leslie Burkhalter, Steve Price, Janis Price, Mark Scott, Lindsay Bergstrom, Isabella Altenbach, and Julian Morris. Through reflection and thoughtful collaboration, this group will work as a team with me to implement this initiative in the coming weeks, months, and year. This is an active, creative endeavor that seeks to evolve and stay faithful to our HAB identity and mission as we provide a place of grace for the next decade.



### Books, and Movies, and Albums...and More Books! By B. J. Hutto, Senior Pastor



Friends,

Several weeks ago, I was blessed to receive what pastors both look forward to and dread the most after they preach: *follow-up questions*. It was Baccalaureate Sunday, and I had preached a sermon about the story of King Solomon, the two moms, and the baby, where I talked about the importance of cultivating wisdom along with knowledge in

one's life. In it, I mentioned a handful of books that I'd read over the years that I thought had helped me better understand different aspects of human nature. Well, that afternoon, a good handful of folks reached out asking about those books, so I thought I would note them in this month's *Herald* as well.

The second half of the sermon was structured around Flannery O'Connor's essay "The Catholic Novelist in the Protestant South." You can probably find it online, but I have it in an anthology of her work called *Mystery and Manners: Occasional Prose*. If you like O'Connor—or even if you were born in the South in the 20<sup>th</sup> century—then I highly recommend grabbing a copy. There are some fantastic pieces in there, and "The Catholic Novelist" is just one of them!

The novels that I mentioned in the sermon are a pretty eclectic group, and that was on purpose:

- The Sparrow, by Mary Doria Russell...which is brilliant but hard to read
- *The Stand*, by Stephen King...which is less scary than you probably think
- *The Poppy War Trilogy*, by R.F. Kuang...which is dark in spots but fantastic
- The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe, by C.S. Lewis...which is an all-time classic!

• *The Power and the Glory*, by Graham Greene...which might be my favorite novel ever An honorable mention should go to *All the King's Men* by Robert Penn Warren, which I realized too late I should've included. Penn Warren was born in Kentucky in 1905 and was one of the great American (and again, Southern) novelists of the last century. *All the King's Men* is his masterpiece and is generally considered, alongside *Moby Dick*, as one of the two greatest American novels ever written. It's a fantastic spin on the story of the legendary/notorious Louisiana politician, Huey Long, and it's a careful examination of human nature as well.

I also mentioned two albums as different takes on heartbreak: Willie Nelson's *Red-Headed Stranger* and Olivia Rodrigo's *Sour*. The first deserves listening to front-to-back. (I \*love\* *Red-Headed Stranger*) But on *Sour*, you could probably just listen to the songs that sound angry :)

And finally, the two movies I mentioned were *Moonlight* and *12 Years a Slave*, both of which are just absolutely gutting....

So, yeah, those are the ones I mentioned! If you have any questions or if you decide to read any of those, let me know! And thanks to everyone who asked!

The Mission Team recently checked in with some of our mission partners to see what is happening in their world. **At UCOM**, they are about mid-way through their 10-week

summer nutrition program. The program serves working families nutritious food for breakfast and lunch and is currently serving about 600 lunches each week.

Because of a building fire in November 2024, **UCOM is fundraising to cover costs for new siding, flooring, and electrical.** If you are interested in helping, please donate online via credit card at <u>ucomjax.org</u> or send a check payable to UCOM UrbanServ, 3349 St. Augustine Road, Jacksonville, FL 32207.

**UCOM is seeking volunteers** who would like to drive their truck one morning a week and can lift 40 pounds to help them "rescue" food from the local Publix and Walmart grocery stores. For more information, please contact Sara Mitchell at UCOM at 904-296-3401.

At Safe Havens, they have expanded the warehouse (located at Creekside Christian Church) to include a separate "donation shed" where individuals can drop off household donations during designated times. In addition, the shed will also be used to organize and store items like dishes and kitchen utensils that are not affected by hot and cold. Safe Havens was also grateful to receive a large donation of new, unsold furniture from Orange Park Furniture which recently went out of business.

**The following types of items are in short supply at the Safe Havens warehouse.** If you have any gently used (or new) items in these categories that you could donate, please text (preferred) or call Debbie Crumb at 904-662-5344.

- Coasters for drinks (also serve as decorative items)
- Picture/Plate Stands of various sizes and finishes (for display on tables or shelves)
- Decorative "balls" or "filler" such as large size potpourri in various colors and finishes (used to add color to a centerpiece bowl)
- Crocheted doilies (used to help hide imperfections in used tables)
- Silverware sets (forks, spoons, knives)
- Blenders
- Curtain rods (50" or larger) with brackets
- Vacuums
- Microwaves (small to medium size only)








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
